The eighth edition of the GLOBED programme is coming to a close. The students have finally submitted their thesis, on which they have been working all year.



The selection process for Cohort X has finished. With more than 1.750 candidatures, the students final list has been reduced to 28.

Preparations for the students' arrival and Welcome Week are in progress. They will meet for the first time in Barcelona in September, when they will take part in activities exploring the UAB campus and the city centre.

Cohort X profiles

Among those selected, the average age is 26 years old. More than a third of scholarship students come from **Asia** (37%), while another third come from **Latin America** (32%). The remaining students are from **Europe** (16%), **Africa** (11%) and **North America**

(5%). Globedians from E10 come from a variety of academic backgrounds. More than a third of them have a Bachelor's degree in Political Science, while 21% each come from International Relations and Education. In addition, some have studied related disciplines such as Sociology, Anthropology Law, or Economics.

About the Selection Process

The Selection Board reviewed all the applications and created a shortlist of candidates for interview with GLOBED academic members. The results were then communicated.

Countries with more applicants are **Pakistan**, **Nigeria** and **India**.

Students from E9 are finishing their first year on the GLOBED programme. In the second semester, they were divided between the University of Glasgow, the University of Cyprus and the University of Bremen. They have all lived and enriching and inspiring experience, specialising different fields of educational policy. Globedians are now moving on to undertake internships.


Bremen Team



France and Belgium have the highest number of internship placements, at more than a third and 14% respectively.






E8 finish their final thesis
